Time of Remembrance Memorial Service Offers Peace for Loved Ones

At Center for Hospice Care (CHC), end-of-life care is not focused solely on the treatment of the physical, emotional and spiritual symptoms of the patient. An often overlooked aspect of the care provided is the support for the emotional pain of family members and loved ones. Through its Life Transition Center (LTC), CHC offers a variety of services for family members to find appropriate ways to grieve and heal. The annual Time of Remembrance Memorial Service is one of these.

According to CHC Bereavement Coordinator Holly Farmer, “CHC’s annual Memorial Service is an opportunity for the bereaved to

remember and honor those who have died, and to receive additional support. The service also gives volunteers and staff the opportunity to honor the deceased. The reception time after the service allows people to connect with others and share stories about their loved ones.”

South Bend, Elkhart and Plymouth each hosted a Memorial Service on November 27, with 398 family members and loved ones attending. Farmer also expressed her appreciation to the 22 staff members and 35 volunteers who worked together to make the events a reality. This was the largest Memorial Service in CHC’s history; and the staff and volunteers who provided music, handed out programs,

ushered, or helped organize the event, made it possible.

The services are non-denominational and include meaningful readings and music, as well as the reading of the names of the loved ones who have died. “Participants have shared that the music is a beautiful and important part of the service, particularly when it is played while the name of their loved one is read aloud,” Farmer said. In some instances, the Memorial Service is the only chance that attendees have to attend a ceremony in honor of their loved one.

The 2017 Time of Remembrance Memorial Service will be held on Sunday, November 19.



Center for Hospice Care Hosts Urban Youth Bereavement Webinar

In the urban areas served by Center for Hospice Care (CHC), stories of death and grief are all too common. To build awareness of the special challenges created by such situations, CHC hosted a webinar called, “Understanding the Impact of Death, Dying, and Bereavement among the Urban Youth Population.” The event, held in October, was primarily for local professionals who work with children and teenagers in high-need urban communities. It was co-sponsored by the Hospice Foundation as part of its ongoing professional education initiatives.

The five-hour online, continuing education panel discussion focused on how a death in the family or community affects the lives of urban youth. The panel also highlighted the challenges youth experience in grieving the death of people in their lives and communities, as well as their need to receive culturally appropriate support.

The more than 20 professionals attending the webinar also learned the importance of incorporating inclusion and restorative perspectives on diversity as part of family support and community outreach efforts. Participants were also guided in identifying personal barriers that challenge professionals who work with diverse populations, as well as institutional barriers to inclusion in programming and staff development.



Helping Hands Award Wall of Fame Unveiling

This year's Circle of Caring event, held on March 16, had special significance. The more than 80 guests were the first to view the brand-new Helping Hands Award Wall of Fame. Center for Hospice Care (CHC) President/CEO Mark Murray and former CHC and Hospice Foundation Board Chair Catherine Hiler had the honors of unveiling the wall, which displays beautiful black and white photos of all Helping Hands Awards recipients recognized during the award's 32-year history. Last year's Helping Hands Award co-recipient and former Mishawaka Mayor Bob Beutter, was on hand to reveal the photo of this year's honorees – community First Responders.

The Helping Hands Award honors an individual, couple or family who has exhibited exceptional generosity or has a history of outstanding community achievements. Through direct financial support or by motivating others to give, award recipients have demonstrated civic and charitable stewardship to improve the quality of living in the communities served by CHC. The awards criteria includes the types of characteristics honorees exhibit, such as:

- Innovative approaches to meeting the community's needs.
- Effectiveness in working with non-profit staff and volunteers.
- Outstanding community achievements and accomplishments.
- Success in recruiting and motivating others toward leadership roles in the community.
- Participation from within non-profit organizations.
- History of inspiring, encouraging and motivating others to give.
- History of leadership within creative initiatives designed to enhance the quality of living in our communities.

The Helping Hands Award recipients who have been honored over the years exemplify many of these characteristics. We are grateful for their service to the communities served by CHC and are pleased to recognize them in this permanent way at our Mishawaka Campus.

“Being Mortal” Screened for Dinner and Learn Event at Center for Hospice Care

Center for Hospice Care (CHC) and the Hospice Foundation (HF) hosted a screening of the PBS Frontline documentary “Being Mortal” on Thursday, March 23 at the organizations' Mishawaka Campus. The film delves into the hopes and fears of patients and families facing terminal illness, and investigates the practice of caring for the dying. The film also explores the unique relationship between patients and their doctors.

It features a surgeon, Dr. Atul Gawande, as he shares stories from the people and families he encounters. When Dr. Gawande's own father gets cancer, his search for answers about how best to care for the dying becomes a personal quest. The film sheds light on how a medical system focused on a cure often leaves out the

sensitive conversations that need to happen so a patient's true wishes can be known and honored at the end of life.

The event began with a complimentary soup/salad/sandwich buffet. The dinner and screening of the documentary was a way to help the more than 50 attendees initiate the tough, but necessary, conversations about end-of-life decisions. Mike Wargo, HF Vice President and COO said, “We chose ‘Being Mortal’ because it underscores the importance of planning ahead and talking with family members about these important decisions.”

There was a panel discussion following the screening, with end-of-life experts Mark Sandock, MD, a local physician consultant; Mark Murray, President and CEO of CHC and HF; and Dominic Vachon, Director of

the Ruth M. Hillebrand Center for Compassionate Care in Medicine at the University of Notre Dame.

On October 19, 2016, Center for Hospice Care (CHC) dedicated a beautiful Veterans Memorial on the grounds of its Mishawaka Campus. As a "We Honor Veterans" Level Four Partner, CHC takes great pride in meeting the unique needs of veterans facing life-limiting illnesses. As CHC President/CEO Mark Murray notes, "Today, one out of every four Americans dying is a veteran. Our goal is to address their end-of-life needs, to serve them as they have served us."

The Veterans Memorial offers many opportunities for people to honor and remember their loved ones. There are memorial bricks and wall plaques available for placement at the memorial. There are also naming opportunities available for other components of the memorial, including benches, flagpoles, trees, entry arbors, or "Poppies," the centerpiece statue.

A dedication ceremony for memorial items will be held this fall. An official

date has yet to be announced, but it will likely be scheduled close to Veterans Day. The gardens offer a quiet and peaceful respite for patients and families during their stay at hospice house.

The Gardens of Remembrance and Renewal also offer families a way to honor their loved ones with a memorial brick, bench, or a flowering or evergreen tree. The purchase of a memorial item also helps ensure that hospice care will be available for eligible patients in the future, even if they don't have the means to pay for it. Bereavement Counselor Greg Suderman commented, "I am thankful that CHC provides this opportunity to keep the memories of our loved ones alive. It is meaningful to see their names in permanent print, knowing that they will be seen, read and remembered for years to come. For those who enjoy the beauty of nature, this is the perfect way to remember dear family members and friends."

The Elkhart Campus Memorial Item Dedication will take place on Tuesday, June 6. This event serves as not only an unveiling of the items donated in the past year, it is also an opportunity for donors and families to gather to celebrate the life of their loved ones. In many cases, it will be the first chance families will have had to come together following their loss. Furthermore, it is a chance to see how the memorial items add to the beauty of the Gardens of Remembrance and Renewal.

Invitations will be mailed in May to all those who have donated memorial items. The event is also open to the public. The ceremony will begin at 5:30pm and will include brief remarks from CHC staff as well as the dedication of the memorial items. Light refreshments will be served following the ceremony.

Camp Evergreen Grows to Meet Demand

"What I liked best about camp was being able to be around others in a similar situation." This is a common sentiment expressed by Camp Evergreen campers. Often, young people don't understand that there are other people their age going through similar experiences. That understanding can help them feel less alone. According to Nancy Patterson, camp director, "Along with providing grief education, opportunities for storytelling and remembrance as well as outdoor fun, Camp Evergreen shows kids that grief doesn't have to be a lonely experience and that there are others out there who have experienced the death of a loved one."

In 2017, Camp Evergreen marks its 24th year of providing a supportive, yet fun,

environment for grieving children and teens. The camp has grown each year, to the point that Center for Hospice Care (CHC) has expanded Camp Evergreen to two separate weekends. Patterson explained, "It is our hope that by holding the teen camp and youth camp on separate dates, we will be able to accommodate more children and teens at each camp and provide an enhanced camp experience for everyone. Having two separate camps allows our staff and volunteers to focus all of their attention and expertise on each population."

This year's teen camp will take place the weekend of June 2-4 at Camp Eberhart in Three Rivers, Michigan. The teens and volunteers will stay overnight in a secure and comfortable lodge. Free transportation

will be provided at designated pickup sites. The youth camp will take place at Camp Raybird in South Bend, Indiana on Saturday, August 26. A registered nurse will be present at both camps at all times.

The camp experience is enhanced by a wide variety of individuals. The volunteers who donate their time are invaluable. An adult buddy is paired with each youth camper and with a small group of teen campers. Camp Evergreen, like all CHC bereavement services, is free to all campers. Camp Evergreen is made possible by the Linda Lloyd Mission Endowment for Camp Evergreen and through the generosity of many donors.

Inaugural “Journeys in Healing” Art Auction

Each person has his or her own way of coping with grief. Some deal with it alone, or through the support of family and friends. Others seek support through counseling, which can be done individually or in a group setting. Center for Hospice Care’s (CHC) Life Transition Center offers a unique approach to supporting its clients in the *After Images* art counseling program.

After Images uses art as an outlet for participants’ grief. They create artwork in a studio space with the support and guidance of Dave Labrum, who brought the program to CHC 17 years ago. Labrum has a master

of fine arts from the University of Michigan and a master’s in counseling from Indiana University, and says the studio is a place where people feel safe, and are able to express their grief openly and honestly.

CHC’s Life Transition Center will host the inaugural “Journeys in Healing” art exhibit and silent auction on Wednesday, June 14. Proceeds from the event will be added to an endowment which has been established for the *After Images* program. The silent auction will include 12 pieces of original art produced by program participants. Also available for purchase will be bundled

notecards made from prints of each piece, limited edition larger prints, as well as copies of the CHC published book, “the hole in me since the day you died.” Two program participants will be on hand to share their artwork and their experience in the program.

Heroes come in all shapes and sizes. Building on the 32-year history of the Walk for Hospice, we re-imagined the event last year as the Heroes for Hospice Fun 5k & Walk. The event remains a time to remember loved ones who are or have been Center for Hospice Care (CHC) patients, but has now become a time to recognize everyday heroes, including fire fighters, police officers, military personnel, healthcare workers and family caretakers.

This year’s event will take place on August 12. Please note that this is a Saturday, which is a change from previous years when the event was on Sunday. Center for Hospice Care Teams with University of Notre Dame for Introduction to Hospice and Palliative Care Class

Center for Hospice Care (CHC) and the University of Notre Dame's Ruth M. Hillebrand Center for Compassionate Care in Medicine (CCCM) partnered once again to offer a unique one credit-hour course – "Introduction to Hospice and Palliative Care." The course gave more than 70 University of Notre Dame undergraduate and graduate students an immersive experience in these complex and critical topics.

"Educating future health care providers about the hospice philosophy, and introducing them to the benefits that hospice and palliative care for those facing life-limiting illnesses, is at the core of the mission of CHC and the Hospice Foundation," said Mike Wargo, Chief Operating Officer of the foundation. "The collaborative nature of this class mirrors hospice's integrated approach to care, as well."

The course covered topics focused on how hospice and palliative care is delivered within the current healthcare system and explored the manner in which palliative care is provided in developing countries with limited access to curative healthcare. Students were also given an introduction to the compassionate interpersonal communication skills required to care for those in need of palliative care or who are dying. Students met on one

weekday evening for three hours in addition to spending a full Saturday in the classroom.

Designed by Wargo and CCCM Director Dominic Vachon, the course included films, panel discussions, lectures and a mock interdisciplinary team meeting. In its fourth offering over the past six years, the class was taught by a team composed of physicians, nurses, social workers, chaplains and bereavement counselors, as well as other hospice and palliative care staff.

Cornerstones for Living:

The Crossroads Campaign

Center for Hospice Care (CHC) announced the public phase of its five-year \$10 million comprehensive fundraising campaign during a press conference on March 16, at its Mishawaka Campus. That same evening, Circle of Caring members and special guests were updated on the campaign during this year's Circle of Caring dinner.

CHC and the Hospice Foundation also provided a sneak preview of the campaign to a group of Circle of Caring members and other supporters in Florida at the Naples Yacht and Sailing Club on February 23.

The centerpiece of "Cornerstones for Living: The Crossroads Campaign" is the construction of two new buildings

on the Mishawaka Campus: a new Clinical Staff Building and a new 12-bed Hospice House overlooking the St. Joseph River. "Most of CHC's patients reside in their homes, nursing homes, or assisted living facilities, so we believe this new inpatient center will improve our ability to meet the needs of patients whose symptoms cannot fully be addressed in those settings," said Mark Murray, CHC President/CEO.

The new clinical staff building will become home to staff members providing hospice care to patients and families throughout CHC's eight-county service area and will replace the organization's current 21-year old clinical staff offices and Hospice House

in Roseland. Staff from the Roseland facility will be relocated to the new Mishawaka building, and the Roseland facility will be retained and repurposed.

"Half of all deaths in America are now under hospice care and that's increasing each year. At CHC, 25% of the 33,000 patients we've cared for over 36 years were seen in the last four years alone. The first of the 76 million baby boomers began signing up for Medicare seven years ago, so the need for hospice care will escalate dramatically over the next 15 to 20 years. This 'Crossroads' campaign is about putting the infrastructure in place today to meet the needs of our community tomorrow," said Murray.

The large number of patients choosing CHC means that an increasing number of loved ones have sought support through the organization's many grief counseling and bereavement services, which are free and open to the public – regardless of whether their loved one was the recipient of hospice care. CHC's specialty programs, including Camp Evergreen, an annual camp for children who have experienced the loss of a loved one, and *After Images*, a popular and innovative art counseling program, are also available to the public and are part of the campaign's endowment goal.

Since beginning the quiet phase in July 2014, CHC has raised more than \$7.6 million. In addition to completing the aforementioned construction projects, funds raised will be used to endow many of CHC's signature programs, provide care for patients with financial needs and fund the agency's many community bereavement programs. Within its nearly 40-year history, this is only CHC's third campaign.

CHC is a nationally recognized and award-winning non-profit organization operating in eight counties across northern Indiana: St. Joseph, Marshall, Elkhart, Fulton, Starke, LaPorte, Kosciusko and LaGrange. From 27 patients in 1980, CHC has grown exponentially, caring for nearly 33,000 patients from 1980 through 2016. In 2016 alone, the organization served 2,109 patients and their families, placing CHC in the top three percent of all hospice programs nationwide. It is

Donor Profile: Mary and Bill Hartman

Mary and Bill Hartman's generous support of Center for Hospice Care (CHC) is a tribute to their care for others and each other. A generous gift of over \$108,000 from the Hartman's estate is extending their legacy of community service and caring for many years into the future.

The Hartmans are remembered as people who regularly helped friends and family through the years. According to those who knew them well, Mary and Bill Hartman believed that their lives were blessed, and they wanted to pass these blessings on to others. They consistently shared their wealth during their lives and with skillful planning made specific arrangements to share their resources after their deaths.

Lives of Service

Mary Price Hartman was a lifelong resident of North Liberty, Indiana. Her only time living away from her hometown was when she attended Indiana University in Bloomington. She graduated in 1937 and began her teaching career in a one-room school house in Liberty

Township. She also worked as a sales representative and demonstrator for Bendix home appliances in the 1950s.

William H. Hartman was born in Salida, Colorado, but moved to northern Indiana in his youth and graduated from high school in South Bend. Bill served in the U.S. Army Air Corps as a flight engineer during World War II. After his military service, Bill became owner of an established family business, Hartman Builders, Inc. which built residential homes and other structures in northern Indiana.

Bill became known as an astute businessman, skilled builder, talented craftsman, as well as an informed and wise investor. Bill was well known in the community and was a long-time member of the South Bend Rotary Club.

Bill and Mary were active members of the North Liberty Methodist Church along with other service and fraternal organizations based near North Liberty. The Hartmans are remembered as hard workers who focused on helping others,

often anonymously. They provided support to children and quietly helped those in financial need.

A Legacy of Hospice Education

CHC is dedicating the Hartman's generous gift to help meet a \$1 million matching grant provided to CHC by the Vera Z. Dwyer Charitable Trust. The funds are being used to establish a hospice and palliative medicine fellowship named in honor of Vera Z. Dwyer.

As part of CHC's Cornerstones for Living: The Crossroads Campaign, Bill and Mary Hartman's estate gift is ensuring that permanent funding will be available to train medical professionals to be certified in hospice and palliative medicine.

CHC and the Hospice Foundation are grateful to be a vehicle that extends the Hartman's legacy of service and giving. Their generosity is helping meet the need of training professionals required to meet the increasing demand for hospice care.
